THE URBAN HEAT ISLANDS

Among the most modified environments on the Earth's surfaces are the places where humans have congregated and built cities. According to the United Nations' World Urbanization Prospects, 56.61% of the world's population lived in urban areas in 2021, a proportion that is expected to increase to 68% by 2050. An urban heat island occurs when, due to human activities, a city creates land use conditions that produce temperatures significantly warmer than adjacent rural areas. The natural land cover is replaced with dense concentrations of pavement, buildings, and other surfaces that absorb and retain heat. Urban land use is viewed as a major contributor to global warming. This presentation, through the use of satellite imagery, will examine various urban landscapes with respect to their temperature conditions.
